SPOTLIGHT ON ENGAGEMENT

INDIA AND SOUTH KOREA

In 2024–2025, Rutgers University strengthened its global presence through targeted partnerships, research collaborations, and expanded opportunities for student and faculty engagement in India and South Korea—two rapidly growing centers of innovation and higher education.

INDIA: DEEPENING ACADEMIC AND RESEARCH PARTNERSHIPS

Rutgers Global advanced several strategic initiatives across India, beginning with a November 2024 delegation visit to Chennai, Kochi, Bengaluru, and Pune. Engagements with premier institutions—including **IIT-Madras** and the **Indian Institute of Science (IISc)**—focused on exploring mobility programs, research collaborations, dual-degree pathways, and signings of Memoranda of Understanding (MoUs).

In March 2025, Rutgers returned to India with a robust delegation of 19 faculty and administrators from across the university, including Rutgers–New Brunswick, Rutgers–Camden, and Rutgers Health, further elevating its national presence. In addition to active participation at the **APAIE 2025 Conference** in Delhi, where the team engaged with more than 2,500 global education leaders, the visit built on sustained institutional relationships and resulted in several significant partnership outcomes.

- An **MoU with IISc**, strengthening joint research and student mobility
- An **MoU between Great Lakes Institute of Management**, Gurgaon, and Rutgers School of Business–Camden, expanding global business education opportunities
- Continuation of the **Rutgers–IIE Thought Leadership Series**
- A major **networking gala co-hosted with IIE**, with more than 200 partners

In August 2025, Rutgers hosted senior leaders from **O.P. Jindal Global University (JGU)**, exploring expanded collaborations across law, business, engineering, the sciences, social work, and public policy.

SOUTH KOREA: ADVANCING INNOVATION AND GLOBAL TALENT EXCHANGE

A high-level Rutgers delegation visited South Korea in October 2024 to strengthen ties with leading universities and the country's thriving biotech and biomedical sectors. The visit resulted in new MoUs with **CHA University**, **Ajou University**/Korea Bio Research Association, **Sungkyunkwan University**, and **Korea University**. The visit also featured milestone events including **Rutgers Partnership Day** and participation in the **K-BioX Summit**.

In March 2025, the Ernesto Mario School of Pharmacy signed an MoU with **Seoul National University (SNU)** School of Pharmacy. Rutgers and SNU have enjoyed a longstanding and successful partnership, and President RYU Hong Lim is a proud Rutgers alum. In June 2025, Rutgers Global and Rutgers Health co-hosted a **Korea-US R&D Collaboration Symposium** on the New Brunswick campus, bringing together government, industry, and academic leaders to explore funding pathways and deepen research partnerships.

Rutgers' engagement continued in July 2025 through participation in **Korea University's Climate Corps Summer School**, the first global climate education program supported by the UNDP Seoul Policy Centre. Rutgers students and faculty contributed to discussions and research on climate adaptation, sustainability, and global environmental challenges.

STUDY ABROAD AND THE CENTER FOR GLOBAL EDUCATION

STUDY ABROAD FALL FAIR DRAWS A CROWD

Rutgers Global hosted its annual Study Abroad Fall Fair on September 2024 in the Livingston Student Center and welcomed nearly 600 students who came to learn about the 100+ study abroad programs in 40+ countries around the world that Rutgers offers. The number of students studying abroad at Rutgers has grown in the years since the pandemic shut down all international travel. Last year, Rutgers celebrated the highest participation in years, with over 1,000 Rutgers students studying across the globe in short-term, semester, and full academic year programs.



RUTGERS WELCOMES A STRONG INCOMING CLASS OF NEW INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS



International Student Orientation Leaders

Rutgers Global hosted a well-attended International Student Orientation (ISO) in August 2024 at the Jersey Mike's Arena and locations across campus. More than 1,200 new international students participated, joined by nearly 300 parents and family members, many of whom first connected with Rutgers through admitted student events and our Pre-Departure Orientation programs in India and China. This represents a substantial increase from 750 attendees in 2023 and reflects the continued momentum in international student engagement.

WORKING GROUP FOR INTERNATIONAL ACADEMIC SUCCESS

The Rutgers Global-International Academic Success Office (IAS) co-chairs with the Senior Vice Provost and Vice Chancellor for Undergraduate Education at Rutgers-New Brunswick a Working Group for International Academic Success that has representatives from key schools and units within the University, including the School of Arts and Sciences (SAS), School of Environmental and Biological Sciences (SEBS), School of Engineering (SOE), Rutgers Business School (RBS), Division of Student Affairs, Learning Centers, Career Exploration and Success, Writing Program, Counseling Services, and Undergraduate Admissions. The goal of the Working Group is to share information, assess needs, and develop strategies to provide holistic support to international students.

In June 2025, a delegation from Rutgers traveled to China and India to meet with newly admitted undergraduate students and their families to answer questions about academics and life at Rutgers.

RU-FYT (FIRST-YEAR TRANSITION COURSE)

Rutgers welcomed students from 83 different countries as part of its incoming class in Fall 2024 with 735 of them enrolled in the First-Year Transition Course (RU-FYT). The course helps students from abroad adjust to campus life in the United States and navigate university resources. RU-FYT is now into its seventh academic year as a credited and graded course taught by trained peer instructors (third- and fourth-year undergraduate students).



The ISSS office coordinates funding and support for refugee and displaced students and scholars from regions including Afghanistan, Ukraine, and Gaza. In collaboration with external and internal partners, students and scholars are connected to comprehensive resources to establish a foundation for their social and economic mobility.


THREE YEARS AFTER FLEEING WAR-TORN UKRAINE, GRADUATE HONORED AMONG RUTGERS' HIGHEST ACADEMIC ACHIEVERS

When Illia Kholiavin fled his war-torn Ukrainian hometown of Mariupol in 2022, he left behind the only life he'd ever known. "What we experienced was brutal. It changed something in us," he said. In May 2025, Kholiavin was inducted into Rutgers University's prestigious Matthew Leydt Society along with 234 of his peers who ranked in the top 2% of Rutgers University-New Brunswick's and Rutgers Health's graduating Class of 2025.






GLOBAL SCHOLARS RECEPTION








