STUDY ABROAD AND THE CENTER FOR GLOBAL EDUCATION

SPOTLIGHT ON GILMAN SCHOLARS

A record 14 Rutgers University students were awarded the prestigious Benjamin A. Gilman International Scholarship to study abroad for the 2022 cycle. Established in 2001, the Gilman International Scholarship is congressionally funded by the Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs at the U.S. Department of State and provides up to \$5,000 to students of limited financial means to intern or study abroad. Gilman scholars were selected from Rutgers-New Brunswick, Rutgers-Newark, and Rutgers Camden.



“The semester was still a period impacted by Covid-19 but I was very excited to attend university in Seoul. Most of the classes were held online, but I was able to go to class in-person twice a week and met many new friends there; they were all professional and had a passion for what they were learning.”

FULBRIGHT: TOP PRODUCER OF FULBRIGHT RECIPIENTS



Rutgers University–New Brunswick was named a top producer for the Fulbright U.S. Student Program, as announced by the U.S. Department of State’s Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs in February 2023. The university had 19 grant recipients, including six from the School of Graduate Studies. The recognition is given to colleges and universities in the United States that received the highest number of applicants selected for the Fulbright U.S. Student Program and requires schools to have at least 10 students offered Fulbright grants.

ACCESS PROGRAMS AT RUTGERS



▶ ACCESS THE WORLD

Rutgers Global-Study Abroad created the Access the World Initiative to ensure every Rutgers student has access to opportunities for global learning which are academically rigorous, degree-relevant, and culturally transformative. Access the World offers a range of semester study abroad programs across the globe at or below the cost of a semester at Rutgers. Studying abroad is not only possible for every Rutgers student, but also an accessible experience that every student should be able to afford.

▶ PASSPORT TO THE WORLD INITIATIVE & IIE PASSPORT PROJECT GRANT

Rutgers Global-Study Abroad launched the Passport to the World initiative with an aim to increase the number of matriculated students with U.S. passports. For the first cycle of the initiative, 176 passports were awarded to Rutgers students from all campuses--Camden, New Brunswick, Newark, and Rutgers Biological and Health Sciences (RBHS). As a result of the early strong student response to the initiative, Rutgers University was selected by the Institute of International Education (IIE) to receive an IIE American Passport Project grant that would support the expenses associated with obtaining additional passports for 25 students for the 2023-2024 cycle.

▶ ACCESS AFRICA

The Center for African Studies and Rutgers Global announced two major scholarships in 2022. The first is a \$1 million grant from the Mad Rose Foundation that provides funding for the creation and support of study abroad programs in Africa. The Mad Rose Foundation is a charitable organization founded by Neal Rosenthal, a proud Rutgers alum (Class of '67). "This significant gift from Neal Rosenthal will be incredibly impactful to our efforts to increase student mobility by creating a new support mechanism for any Rutgers student to participate in short-term study abroad programs in Africa," noted Vice President for Global Affairs Eric Garfunkel. The second is the Wangari Maathai Scholarship, which offers an additional \$125,000 in scholarships targeted to expand semester study abroad in Africa through program scholarships and flight vouchers.

▶ GLOBAL JUSTICE FELLOWS

The Center for Global Education, in collaboration with the Institute for the Study of Global Racial Justice (ISGRJ), launched the Global Justice Fellows program in 2022. This signature program is a leadership experience designed to bring students together across areas of difference to engage in cross-cultural exchange, critical dialogue, diversity, inclusion, and equity education and to empower them with the critical analysis, knowledge, and skills necessary to be lifelong, trans-national activists. The Spring 2023 program brought together twelve distinguished students from study abroad programs across Europe and focused on the theme of “Migration, Displacement, and Belonging.” Students had the opportunity to network with Rutgers alumni in Europe, participate in a leadership roundtable with Rutgers university administrators, attend a performance at Shakespeare’s Globe Theater, and explore the city of London while meeting activist leaders and local community members.

▶ STAFF GLOBAL LEARNING FELLOWS PROGRAM

In 2022, the Center for Global Education launched the Staff Global Learning Fellows Program, a professional development opportunity for mid-career professionals at Rutgers. The program allows staff members the opportunity to gain field-based experience designing and running a global learning program, under the guidance of an experienced Rutgers University faculty member. Nicole Boily-Keuscher, Department Administrator at Thrive Student Support Services, part of the Division of Diversity, Inclusion, and Community Engagement at Rutgers, participated in the Romania Social Work program with Rebecca Davis, Associate Professor of Professional Practice at the School of Social Work. Other fellows were Keywaun Caulk, Director of the Center for Social Justice Education and LGBT Communities, and Shawn Lawson, Residence Life Coordinator for Honors College.

STUDY ABROAD: FACULTY HIGHLIGHT

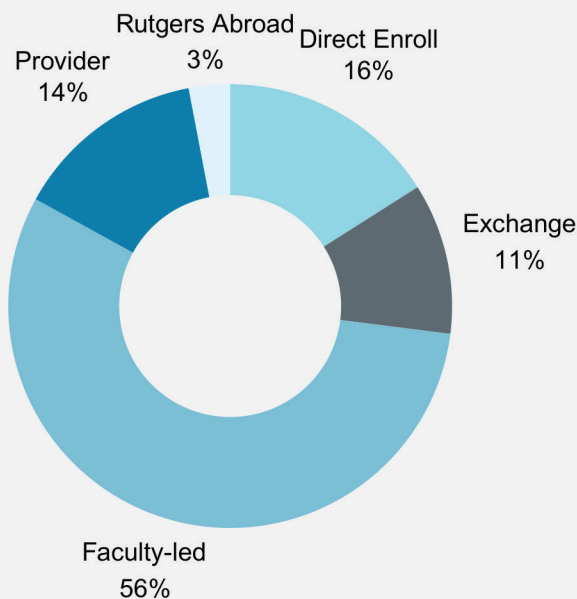
PROFESSOR MARK ROBSON: BACK IN BANGKOK



As a public health scientist and professor at Rutgers University–New Brunswick, Mark Robson prefers taking his students out in the field, which happens to involve a two-week trip to Thailand. After a three-year pandemic pause during which the program was conducted remotely, Robson resumed his annual service-learning visit to the southeastern Asian nation known for its universal health care system. Robson, who has led these summer study trips for 12 years, said the program *“exposes these young people to a system that is very unique for them,and I hope it inspires them to think about a career in public health, especially with a global aspect.”*

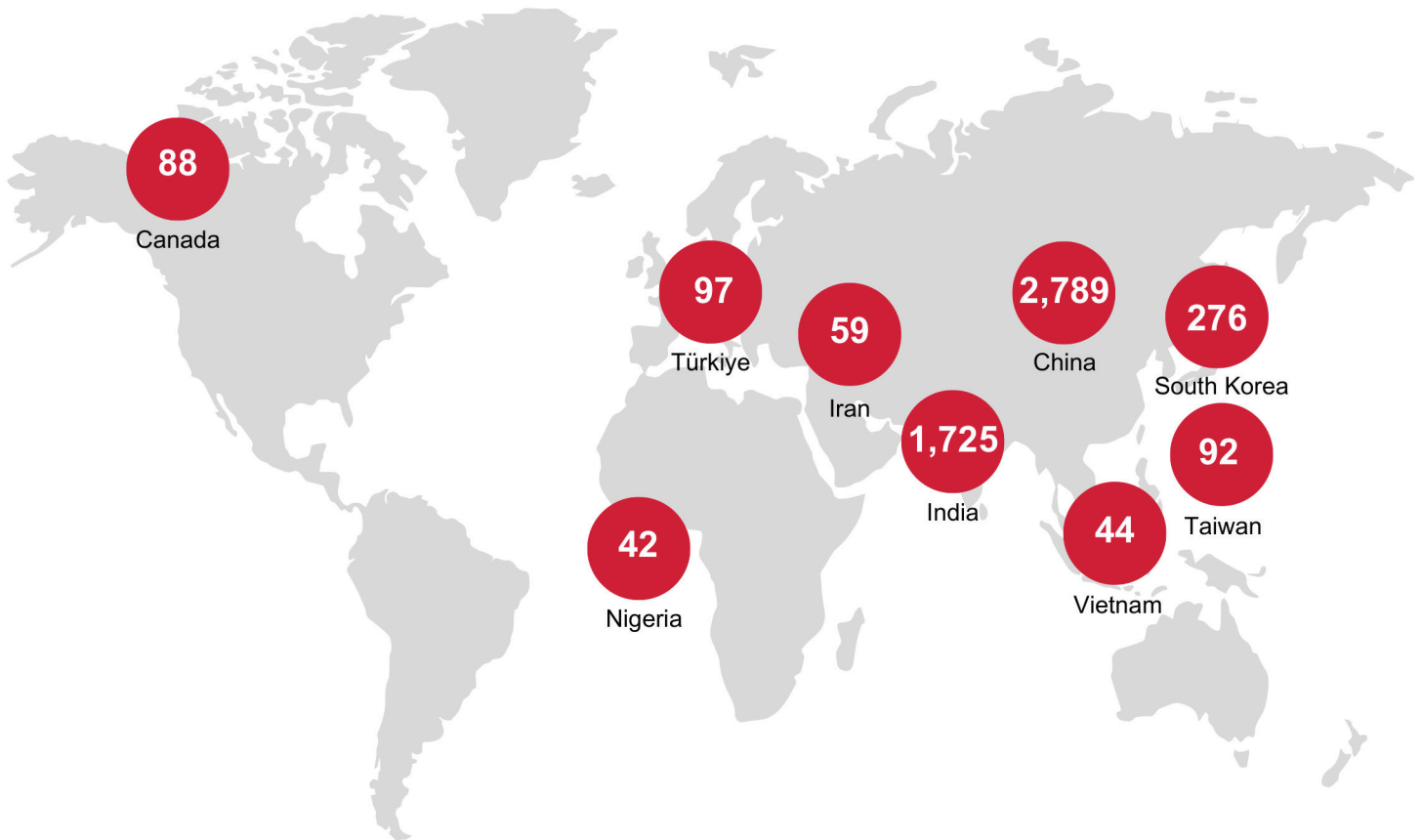

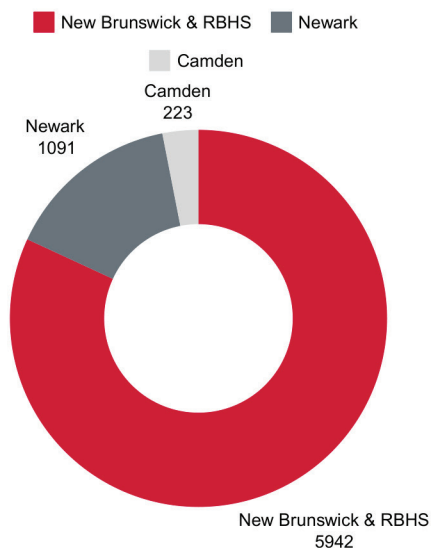

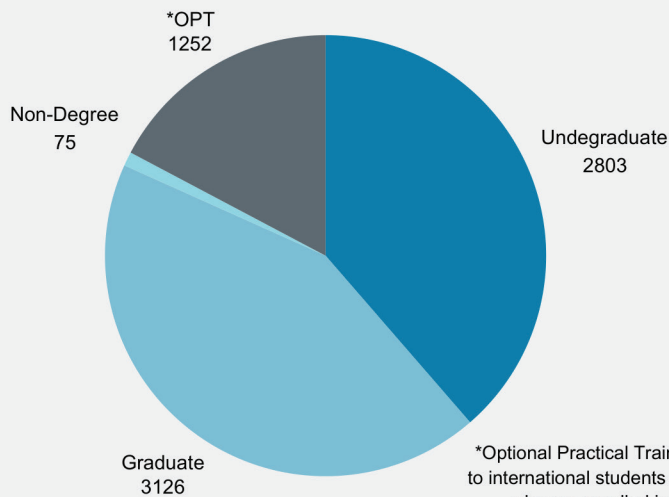

➤ PRE-DEPARTURE ORIENTATIONS IN INDIA AND CHINA

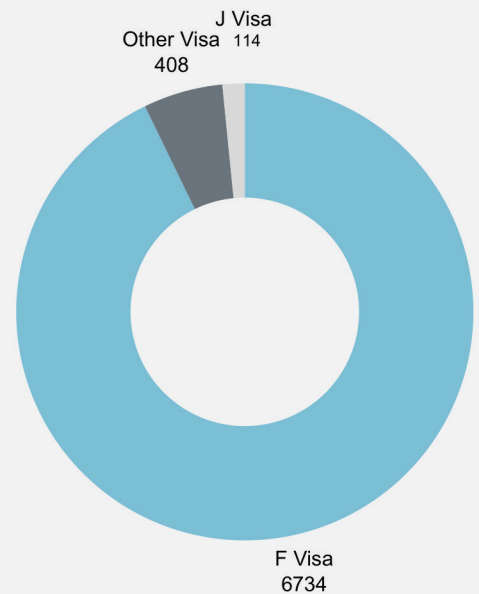

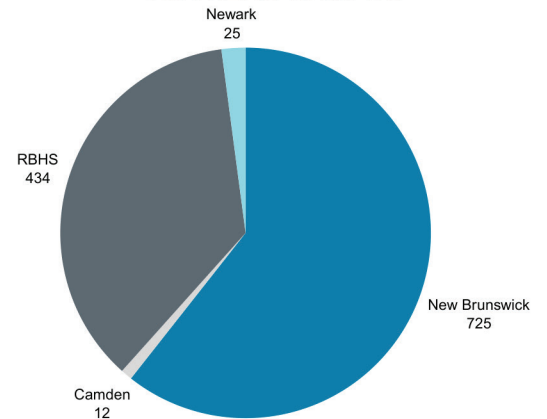

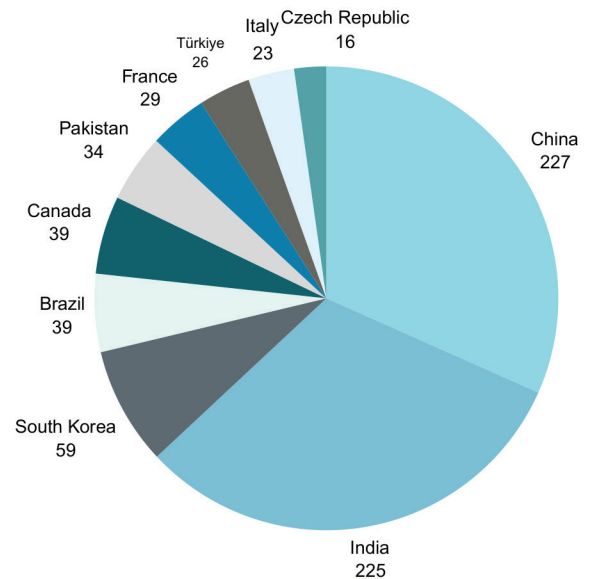

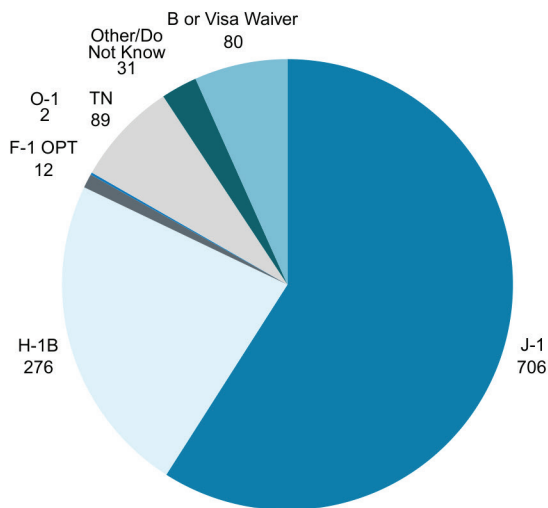

SPOTLIGHT ON ENGAGEMENT IN AFRICA

➤ MANDELA WASHINGTON FELLOWSHIP

In the summer of 2022, Rutgers University welcomed 50 of Africa's emerging leaders for two six-week Leadership Institutes as part of the Mandela Washington Fellowship, which is sponsored by the U.S. Department of State. The Fellows brought with them a wealth of talents and interests, and represented 24 of Africa's 54 countries. Rutgers has been chosen as an Institute Partner each year since the program's inception in 2014 and has hosted more than 350 Fellows.



➤ AMARA CHINEME'S STORY

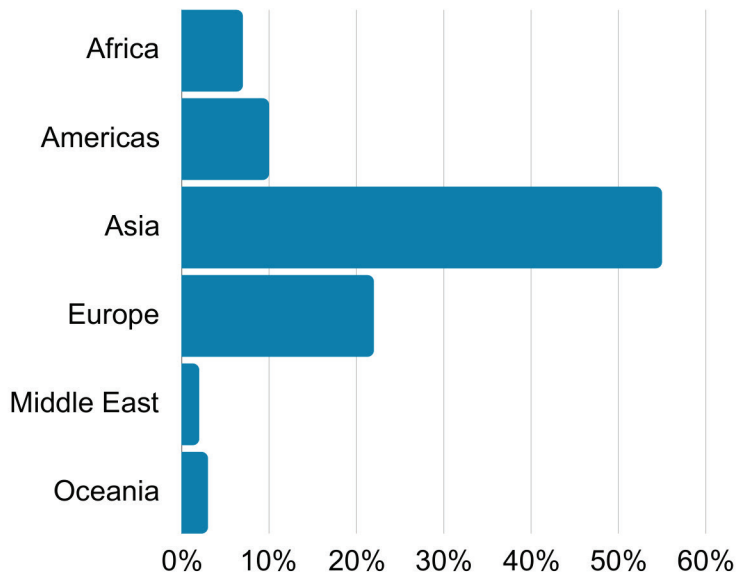
➤ NIGERIA DELEGATION

Rutgers University was proud to host the annual meeting of the Senior International Officers of the Big Ten Academic Alliance in June 2023.



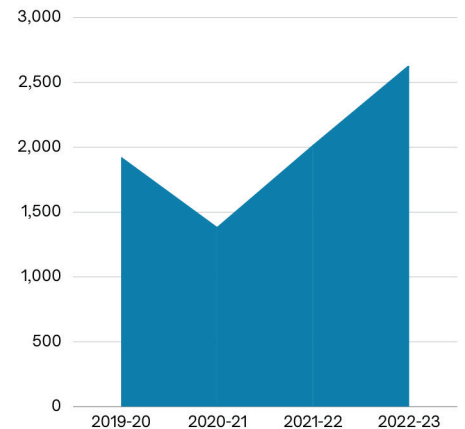
PROGRAMS

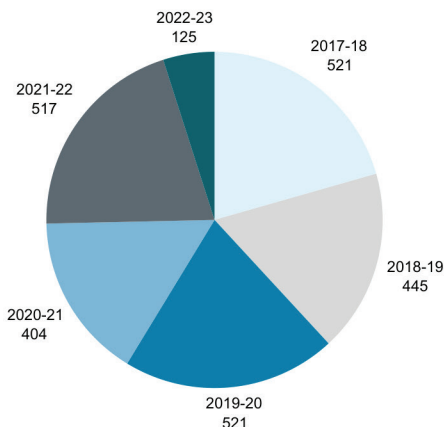

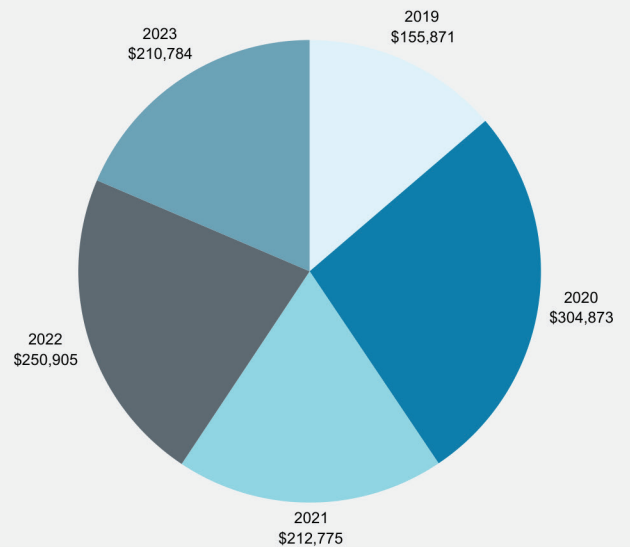
FACULTY ENGAGEMENT

UN ENGAGEMENT

▶ RUTGERS DELEGATION AT COP27

A delegation from Rutgers University attended the Conference of the Parties of the United Nations Framework on Climate Change (UNFCCC), or COP27, in 2022, including Robin Leichenko, Professor of Geography and Co-Director of the Rutgers Climate Institute and Katherine Cann, a PhD student in the department of Geography, as well as two Rutgers Mandela Washington Fellow alums, Shimbi Rhode (Namibia) and Rokiatou Traore (Mali).

➤ ALUMNI RECEPTION IN TAIWAN

An alumni dinner, held at the Caesar Hotel in Taipei in March 2023, was hosted by Rutgers Global and Dr. Karen WeiRu Lin, Associate Dean for Global Health at Robert Wood Johnson Medical School, and attended by thirty alumni from across the region.

➤ ALUMNI RECEPTION IN SINGAPORE

A delegation from Rutgers Global traveled to Singapore in April 2023 to engage with Rutgers alumni and deepen partnerships in the region. The alumni reception was hosted with the Rutgers Alumni Association, and Rutgers Business School.



➤ ALUMNI, PARTNERS, STUDENTS IN CHINA

In April 2023, a team from Rutgers Global visited China to engage with newly admitted students, alumni, and institutional partners. They visited six cities—Shanghai, Beijing, Guangzhou, Tianjin, Suzhou, and Wuhan—where they met with 20 partner institutions, hosted a series of alumni receptions and two new student events that drew 250 students and their families.



▶ ALUMNI RECEPTION IN INDIA

In January 2023, Prabhakar Moghe, EVPAA, alongside Rutgers representatives, hosted an alumni and friends gathering in Mumbai. Mohini Mukherjee, who leads Rutgers University’s India engagement, reflected: *“I am grateful that we had the opportunity to travel to India with key leaders of the University. Their commitment to traveling abroad and meeting in-person with our alumni sends an important message.”*

▶ ASSATA DAVIS WINS PRESTIGIOUS MARSHALL SCHOLARSHIP

Assata Davis, who graduated from Rutgers in 2021, was named a 2023 Marshall Scholar, one of only 40 U.S. residents to receive the postgraduate honor. Davis will study strategic communications at the London School of Economics and Political Science and refugee and forced migration studies at Oxford University.

▶ DAN TORSIELLO HELPS CHILDREN IN DEMOCRATIC REPUBLIC OF THE CONGO

Dan Torsiello, proud Rutgers alum and previous manager of the men’s basketball team, opened a school serving 260 children in the Democratic Republic of the Congo, with additional plans for an orphanage and medical center through a nonprofit he founded, The Kivu Project.



▶ NINA GOHEL WINS FELLOWSHIP AT YENCHING ACADEMY IN CHINA

Nina Gohel, an alumna from the class of 2023, was selected as a Yenching Scholar, which promotes global progress and cultural understanding. Recipients of the fellowship are awarded full funding to pursue a two-year interdisciplinary China studies master’s degree program at the Yenching Academy of Peking University in China.

Ji-Yeung Jang, Assistant Vice President for Global Affairs

Ji-Yeung Jang joined Rutgers Global as the Assistant Vice President for Global Affairs in July 2022, overseeing global partnerships, regional initiatives, and global programs and projects at the University. A seasoned professional in the field of international education, Jang's journey to Rutgers stretched across the globe, beginning in South Korea with stops along the way in Israel, Australia, and Kenya. Prior to Rutgers, Jang served as Director of the Office of Global Affairs and then Interim Executive Director for Global Affairs at Ohio University, where she oversaw pan-university internationalization efforts.

Pablo Arenas Gallo is the Peace Corps Recruiter at Rutgers University. 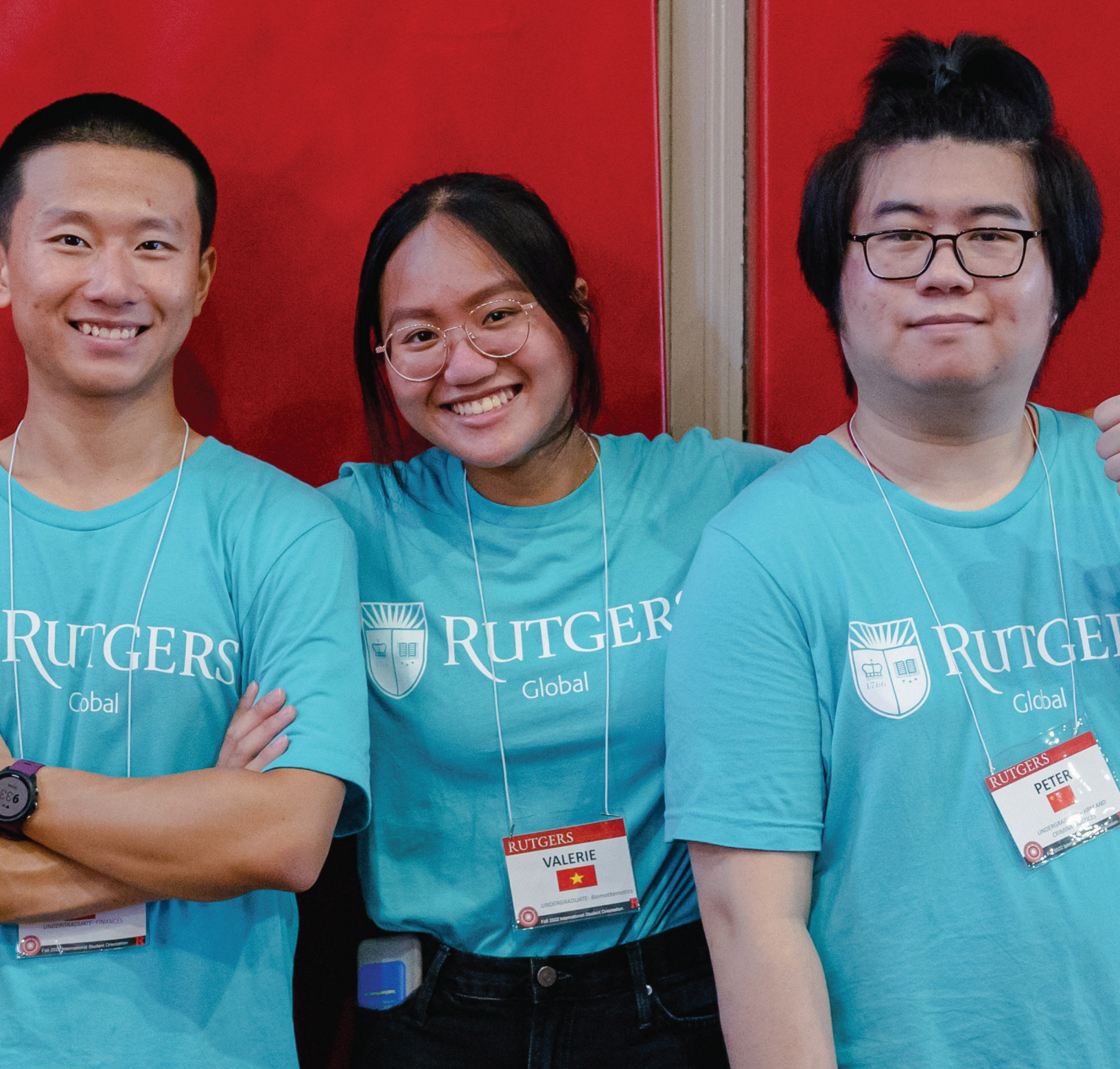
Rutgers Global: Bringing the World to Rutgers and Rutgers to the World
