





FULBRIGHT AT RUTGERS

In October, it was announced that Rutgers University-New Brunswick was again named a top producer of the Fulbright U.S. Student Program, a distinction announced by the United States Department of State's Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs. The university produced 12 Fulbright students, including recent college graduates and students attending the School of Graduate Studies and Robert Wood Johnson Medical School. In addition, Rutgers University-Newark was proud to be named as a Fulbright Hispanic-Serving Institution (HSI) Leader for 2023.

PASSPORT TO THE WORLD INITIATIVE EXPANDS ACROSS RUTGERS

Rutgers Global-Study Abroad launched the Passport to the World Initiative, which seeks to increase the number of Rutgers University matriculated students with U.S. passports. It has received immense support from across Rutgers, with Rutgers University-Camden Chancellor Antonio Tillis and Associate Dean of International Students and Global Programs Elizabeth Atkins announcing in September 2023 that all qualified Camden campus students would be awarded grants. Passport to the World is open to all Rutgers University campuses, levels of study, and majors.

ANDREW KRAPIVIN EARNS CHURCHILL SCHOLARSHIP, THE FIRST AT **RUTGERS IN A DECADE**

In January, Andrew Krapivin was named a Churchill Scholar, becoming the first Rutgers University-New Brunswick student in a decade to earn the award that funds graduate study at the University of Cambridge in England. Previously, he was named a Goldwater Scholar for his work in theoretical computer science involving the optimization of algorithms.

STUDY ABROAD STUDENT SPOTLIGHT: MEET SHARELLIS SEPULVEDA

When Sharellis Sepulveda first enrolled at Rutgers University in Camden, she wasn't sure what she wanted to study. But as a first-generation student who had come to the United States with her family from the Dominican Republic when she was 13 years old, she did know she was passionate about attending college. Sepulveda matriculated at Camden Honors College, double majoring in criminal justice and global studies with minors in Spanish and sociology, and studied abroad at the University of Manchester in England for a semester after receiving a prestigious Benjamin A. Gilman Scholarship for International Study (and a Media Team Scholarship). Looking ahead, she plans to eventually work in a diplomatic position, helping underserved people around the globe. As for her time at Rutgers University-Camden, she found it truly transformative.



PRE-DEPARTURE ORIENTATIONS IN INDIA AND CHINA



A group of senior administrators and academic leaders from Rutgers traveled to India and China in the summer of 2023 to conduct Pre-Departure Orientations (PDOs) for admitted students in Delhi, Mumbai, Shenzhen, and Shanghai. "These PDOs provide an excellent opportunity to meet our newest international students and help set them up for success at Rutgers," said Anu Gupta, Assistant Dean of Global Academic Programs, who organizes the events.

RU-FIT: RUTGERS GLOBAL'S FIRST-YEAR INTERNATIONAL STUDENT TRANSITION COURSE



Rutgers welcomed students from 83 different countries as part of its incoming class in the fall of 2023, with 438 of them enrolled in the First Year International Transition Course (RU-FIT). The course helps students from abroad adjust to campus life in the United States and navigate university resources. RU-FIT is now in its seventh academic year as a credited and graded course taught by trained peer instructors (third- and fourth-year undergraduate students).

PROGRAMMING TO SUPPORT INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS



Our International Student Services team partners with Rutgers CAPS Mental Health Services to provide a series of Wellness Workshops each semester to help support international students with topics that might especially resonate for them.



ISSS also holds special workshops each semester to help students navigate issues like off-campus employment (CPT and OPT) and more.

ADVISING AND COMPLIANCE

In the last year, the International Student Services team has conducted 1,234 one-on-one appointments with students to advise on topics such as employment, change of visa status, program changes, and status maintenance. 6,022 students were seen in virtual "drop-in" advising sessions, which support students with questions that can be addressed more quickly. In addition to advising, our team processed 20,536 document requests for students in Academic Year 2023-24.

PROGRAMMING TO SUPPORT INTERNATIONAL FACULTY & SCHOLARS





MANDELA WASHINGTON FELLOWSHIP

In June, Rutgers welcomed 25 emerging leaders from Africa for a six-week Leadership in Business Institute, sponsored by the U.S. Department of State. Rutgers has been chosen as an Institute Partner each year since the program's inception in 2014. A special part of this year's program was a networking event set up by Neal Rosenthal, founder of the Mad Rose Group and a proud Rutgers alum (Class of '67), who has helped set up the Access Africa Initiative at Rutgers. This initiative aims to enhance undergraduate education in African Studies at Rutgers University through travel support for study abroad programs in Africa.



RUTGERS TRAVELS TO INDIA TO EXPAND EDUCATIONAL PARTNERSHIPS

In February, Rutgers University was part of the Institute of International Education's (IIE) Delegation that convened 100+ higher education leaders and senior officials from both countries. Vice President for Global Affairs Rick Garfunkel and Executive Director of International Student Services Mohini Mukherjee from Rutgers Global represented the University and met with alumni while in India.

IIE-INDIA VISITS RUTGERS

In May, Rutgers Global was honored to host Vivek Mansukhani, Head of the Institute for International Education (IIE) - India office, and Akta Sawhney, Senior Program Specialist at IIE-India, at Rutgers University in New Brunswick. Our team had the pleasure of engaging in inspiring discussions on enhancing educational collaborations between India and the U.S. We explored new opportunities for student exchanges, academic partnerships, and innovative programs that will foster global learning and cross-cultural understanding.

ADVANCING U.S.-INDIA EDUCATIONAL COLLABORATION

Mohini Mukherjee served as a content leader for an initiative led by the University of Denver, supported by the U.S. Consulate General Mumbai and Rajika Bhandari Advisors. The collaboration resulted in a free online course for Indian HEI faculty and staff, focusing on internationalization, U.S.-India educational ties, and partnership best practices.

DELEGATION FROM TAIWAN'S NATIONAL SUN YAT-SEN UNIVERSITY VISITS RUTGERS

Rutgers hosted a prestigious delegation from National Sun Yat-sen University (NSYSU) led by President Ying-Yao Cheng. Together they signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU), resulting in mutual agreements at multiple levels including student mobility, faculty exchange, and research collaboration. The ceremony was attended by university leaders including Rutgers University-New Brunswick Chancellor Francine Conway and School of Engineering Dean Alberto Cuitiño. Following the visit, NSYSU President Cheng assumed his role as the Education Minister of Taiwan.

RUTGERS AND SOUTHEAST UNIVERSITY SIGN MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

In April, a distinguished delegation from Southeast University in China visited Rutgers and was led by University Council Chairman Zuo. The centerpiece of the visit is a 3+2 Memorandum of Understanding (MOU), the first agreement between two universities. Rutgers welcomed the first cohort of 3+2 students from SEU in the fall of 2024, and we believe that this partnership will lead to even greater success in jointly nurturing more outstanding talents in the future.

CHINA DELEGATION VISITS RUTGERS TO ENCOURAGE INTERNATIONAL EXCHANGE

A delegation of 27 representatives from leading Chinese universities visited Rutgers University in late September to meet and discuss ways to collaborate in the areas of student and faculty exchange and international research. Organized by the China Education International Exchange Association (CEAIE), a Chinese organization focusing on facilitating conversation between China and the world in the field of education, the "Double First-Class" universities represented included Peking University, Beijing Normal University, Fudan University, South China University of Technology, and more.

SEOUL NATIONAL UNIVERSITY DEEPENS PARTNERSHIP WITH RUTGERS

Rutgers and Seoul National University (SNU) have a longstanding and successful partnership that began in 2009, primarily focused on student exchange. In October, the two institutions signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) that expands their partnership beyond student exchange to other areas of interest, including faculty exchange and research collaboration. New Jersey Governor Phil Murphy and Rutgers Executive Vice President & Chief Operating Officer Antonio Calcado traveled to South Korea with Assistant Vice President for Global Affairs Ji-Yeung Jang for the ceremony.


RUTGERS GLOBAL CELEBRATES GRADUATING INTERNATIONAL AND STUDY ABROAD STUDENTS





GLOBAL GRANTS SPOTLIGHT: FIORELLA PRADA



Fiorella Prada, assistant professor in the Department of Marine and Coastal Sciences (DMCS), was awarded a two-year Rutgers Global Environmental Change Grant for the project, "Upwelling Systems: thermal refugia for reef-building corals in the Eastern Tropical Pacific." Fiorella's project aligns with the missions of local non-governmental organizations such as Raising Coral Costa Rica and alliances such as the Culebra Reef Gardens Alliance that are working to restore corals reefs in Costa Rica.

RUTGERS ALUMS ENGAGING GLOBALLY



Vukosi Marivate: After receiving his doctoral degree in computer science from Rutgers University in 2015, Vukosi Marivate has risen to become a global leader in teaching machines to process languages, particularly those spoken in Africa. Now as chair of data science at University of Pretoria, South Africa he is teaming up with Critical AI @ Rutgers, an interdisciplinary initiative that aims to deepen the understanding of the emerging technology to make sure no culture is left out of the AI revolution. "This revolution is coming or is already here and we want to make sure that Africans benefit."



Sheldon Morris: It is no exaggeration to say a few Learning Abroad courses changed the trajectory of Sheldon Morris's life. The Rutgers University–Camden alumnus lives in Paris, where he works as an engineering consultant and has planted roots in Europe, which surprises even him some days. "If you had told me when I was 18, I'd be working in Paris, speaking and understanding French with native speakers, I would have been shocked," Morris said. "It wasn't even in my realm of possibilities."



Mohammed Sanu: For years Mohamed Sanu made his mark on the football field at Rutgers and then for the NFL. Now he is working to make a difference for children in Sierra Leone, his mother's native country where he lived briefly growing up. After a decade in the National Football League, Sanu was released by the Miami Dolphins and decided to dedicate his time to a project with Develop Africa, a non-profit that empowers people in poverty in Freetown, the capital of Sierra Leone. Now he is working side by side with his mother, Aminata Koroma, to improve his native country.




Stephanie Acuna Named Campus Partner of the Year
