



Department of Homeland Security Announces Changes to USCIS Filing Fees,
Updated 10/02/2020

9/30/2020 Update: JUDGE BLOCKS USCIS FEE INCREASES

On September 29, 2020, a Federal District Court issued a nationwide preliminary injunction blocking the implementation of the new [USCIS fee rule](#) in its entirety pending further litigation. The new fees and form versions associated with that rule that were to be required on October 2, 2020, as well as all other aspects of the rule, are now on hold. The Department of Homeland Security announced a [final rule \(PDF\)](#) on 07/31/2020 that adjusts fees for certain immigration and naturalization benefit requests. The proposed changes were scheduled to become effective on 10/02/2020. USCIS also planned on updating several different forms. These changes are temporarily suspended until further notice as a result of the latest update.

As of now, USCIS' existing filing fees remain in effect (pending further litigation) and USCIS will continue to accept forms with the current editions and current fees. USCIS will use regulations and guidance currently in place to adjudicate applications and petitions. For more information on current filing fees, please see below:
