Students taking higher level psychology modules would need to have broad prior study of psychology in their degree.

General pre-requisites

Applicants for Level 2000 courses should have a background in the subject area, for example one or two previous successfully completed university level courses in the subject area or with transferable skills/knowledge. Applicants for Level 3000 courses should be a major in that subject and have extensive knowledge of the subject area.

All courses on the Study Abroad Programme are worth 15 UK credits/7.5 ECTS, and most US universities award 4 US credits. A full-load at City is 60 credits.
