ACADEMIC MODEL

ACADEMIC SYSTEM AND STRUCTURE

Larger classes are usually lecture-based, whereas smaller classes are run more like seminars. Class assessments are usually based upon a combination of quizzes, presentations, papers, and exams.

At Yonsei University, there is a strict attendance policy, especially in relation to language courses. A student must be present 2/3 of the time in any given course to receive a grade.

Summer and January courses are highly intensive, fast paced, and place an emphasis on independent study. See the charts below to get a better idea of what your course schedule will look like.

Summer classes are held every day from Monday – Thursday.

The YISS Program does offer a few select 4-week courses. There is no difference in program fee if a student takes the 4-week course instead of the 6-week course. USAC students are not allowed to enroll in only 4-week courses for the summer; students must enroll in at least one 6-week course. Please note that Korean Language courses are not available in the 4-week format.

DIFFERENCES BETWEEN U.S. AND HOST UNIVERSITY EDUCATION SYSTEM

It is important to be prepared for some differences that you may notice in the South Korean education system, so pay close attention to the guidelines set by the professor and be respectful of any rules put in place. Students sometimes find that they have expectations of professors that may not be applicable in other cultures. However, there are lots of support resources for international students, and past students found them very helpful for adjusting to a new academic culture.

COURSE LEVELS

Upper vs Lower Division Courses

The first three letters show which department the course is offered from. Among the four numbers that follow, the first number shows the targeted year of the course. For example, ECO1234 would be a lower division economics course and ECO4567 would be an upper division course.

Graduate Level Course Availability

Graduate courses are not available during the YISS or WAY programs.

CAMPUSES

Yonsei University has three campuses: the Sinchon main campus, the Songdo international campus, and the Mirae campus. You can read more about the different campuses <u>here</u> and view a map of the campuses <u>here</u>.

The YISS and WAY programs are both located on the Sinchon campus, which is also referred to as the main campus.

CREDIT LOADS

Courses are typically 3 Korean credits each.

Definitions of full-time status may vary between USAC, the host university, the agency monitoring your visa, your home university, and any agency providing you with a scholarship or grant. Therefore, it is extremely important that you take the time to review all the agreements you have made with USAC and beyond (visa, financial aid, scholarships, etc.).



Below are USAC's required full-time credit requirements.



Courses taken online or concurrently through your home university do not count in meeting the USAC full-time credit requirement. You should check with your home university, financial aid office, etc. to see what additional minimum credit requirements you might have. **Maintaining full-time status is your responsibility.** If you're concerned about whether you're taking a full course load, contact your USAC Program Advisor.

Note to Graduating Students

If you plan to graduate the semester you study abroad, there is a very high likelihood that your transcript from the host university will not arrive in time. You should plan to delay graduation one semester if your last semester in college is abroad with USAC and your home university has very strict deadlines for submitting the final transcript. COURSES AND REGISTRATION

COURSES

Most, if not all, courses offered in the YISS and WAY programs are taught in English. You can find a list of courses (and their syllabi) offered for both programs below:

Courses for the summer are typically updated on the website in January (~6 months prior), while the January courses are typically updated in September (~4 months prior).

Prerequisites

The host university may have prerequisites like any other university. Staff at the program site will have a copy of your official transcripts and will work with academic departments to determine whether or not you fulfill the prerequisites. The syllabi will also help you and your advisor decide if you have the necessary academic background to take a particular course.



Obtaining Course Descriptions/Syllabi for Home University Pre-Approval

If the courses are not available for your intended term, we advise you to review the course offerings that are currently published for the host university for the previous year. However, you should expect that there would be variations from year to year as at any university. For this reason, you should be flexible with your courses and always have alternatives in mind.

INTERNSHIPS—SUMMER ONLY

Students are eligible to participate in Yonsei University's Korea Summer Internship Program (approximately 20 hours per week; 2 credits; pass/fail only). Students enrolled in the internship program must also be enrolled in at least one other course for a total of 5 or 8 credits.

The Corporate Internship Program offers you direct exposure to global corporate settings in the heart of Seoul, taking advantage of Yonsei University's vast alumni networks, and strong ties with business and educational partners. The Research Internship Program offers selected students the opportunity to participate in research projects or work as an intern in research centers or organizations at Yonsei University.

You will follow the procedures for registering for an internship through Yonsei. Information is located <u>here</u>. Students who are approved for an internship must arrive at the program site early and should plan accordingly. Please refer to the <u>USAC calendar</u> for dates.

COURSE REGISTRATION

Once you are approved by USAC, you will complete an online host university application process to Yonsei University. Then, once you are accepted to Yonsei University, you will be emailed an acceptance packet from them. The acceptance letter will include the date that courses for your term will be available to review. It will include information about how and when to register for courses using the online course registration system (Yonsei Portal system). You should create calendar reminders (taking the time difference into account) so you don't forget to register for classes and register late. You can use a time converter like this to account for the time change.

Course registration operates on a first-come, first-served basis. All students register for courses at the same time through the Yonsei Portal system and therefore getting a spot in some courses may be competitive. Yonsei University does not guarantee registration for any specific courses. You are advised to plan ahead with your academic advisor at your home university to make sure that requirements are met and that credits can transfer. Do not wait until the last minute to start registering for courses, as you may encounter technical problems that cannot be resolved immediately.

Once the official online registration period opens, you should continue to check the website frequently since additional seats in classes may be opened unexpectedly. You may not be able to register for all the classes you wish to take during the online registration period. If that happens, there may be the opportunity to register manually upon arrival at Yonsei. You will receive guidelines on how to do this during the mandatory on-site orientation.

It's important to have alternate courses you can take and receive credit at your home university in case course(s) you want are unavailable.

Ultimately, it is your responsibility to seek sufficient academic advice, to know and meet your degree requirements, and to enroll in and complete the appropriate courses for your individual progress toward your degree.



Courses and Subject Areas Not Guaranteed

Students are not guaranteed their preferred courses or subject areas. Both the YISS & WAY programs require a minimum number of 10 students to enroll in a course, otherwise it may be cancelled. In the event that your class is cancelled due to the 10-student minimum policy, immediately consult the YISS or WAY office regarding alternate course registration.

If you are not able to be flexible with the courses, you may want to consider a different USAC program.

Add/Drop Courses

Course changes are only available through the Portal System (http://portal.yonsei.ac.kr) during the add/drop period. The YISS & WAY programs have an add/drop period at the beginning of the term. Adding or dropping courses during either program is strongly discouraged due to the short duration of the programs.

Please note that the office will not issue course enrollment confirmations. If you make any changes to your course selection, notify your academic advisor at your home university as this could affect your financial aid or your degree plan.

IN THE CLASSROOM

CLASS SCHEDULE

Students must refer to their account information to confirm and finalize their course registration. You can check your final course enrollment and schedule on Yonsei's Portal system by logging in and clicking Academic Information System > Academic Management System > English (to switch language) > Course > Course Enrollment > Enrollment Status.

TEXTBOOKS

Your course materials, including textbooks, will be available for purchase at the program site once you've finalized your registration.

FINAL EXAMS/ASSESSMENTS

Courses require a mid-term examination, a final examination, and often a term paper. Students are not allowed to leave Yonsei until they have finished their last scheduled class/exam.

ACADEMIC / DISABILITY SUPPORT



ACADEMIC ACCOMMODATIONS

While abroad with USAC, you will be enrolled at a host university and will be able to access any of the existing disability support for the local students. Keep in mind that the Americans with Disabilities Act does not apply in other countries, though most countries have a similar regulation. You can find more information regarding disability accommodations in your Student Gateway in a document called **Wellness Guide.**

Different educational systems and teaching styles may prevent some of the accommodations you are used to receiving at your home university. We encourage you to be flexible and have a serious conversation with your disability office to make sure you have a plan to stay on track in a new classroom environment.

ACCOMMODATIONS REQUEST WITH THE HOST UNIVERSITY

You will have a host university application process, be sure to provide any accommodations that you may need on this application in order to initiate the local process for requesting accommodations. You should also mention it on your **Medical Information Form** in Gateway so we can discuss how best to proceed. COUNSELING SERVICES

Psychological Counseling Center

Besides personal or group counseling and psychological examinations, the Counseling Center also holds activities such as symposiums. Services are free and confidential.

International Counseling & Coaching Service (ICCS)

The <u>ICCS</u> is a multicultural counseling and coaching service center for international students and is located off campus. The service provides psychotherapy regarding depression, anxiety, family/relationship issues, and cultural adaptation issues. There is also a Sexual Harassment Prevention Center.
